# <u>Prescription Medication and Opioid Overdose:</u> <u>A Washtenaw County Epidemic</u>

The Lazarus Project has come to Washtenaw County. This is a community coalition developed to prevent prescription medication and opioid overdose. Participants included family practitioners, physicians and nurses from local ED, school teachers, law enforcement, substance abuse treatment counselors, pharmacists, dentists, religious leaders, community health clinics, mental health professionals, and government officials. Following a daylong seminar, participants were encouraged to share pertinent information with their colleagues to support this effort.

Prescription medication and opioid overdose has become an epidemic in Washtenaw County. Last year 65 people died from opioid or heroin overdose. In the first six months of 2015, 27 people died. From April of 2011 to March of 2015 over 400 county residents were admitted to University of Michigan or Saint Joseph Mercy hospitals for overdoses associated with opioids. Those admitted for unintentional opioid overdose were older, female (60%) and predominantly white (average age 51 years old and 81% white. Individuals admitted for unintentional heroin overdose tend to be younger and male (average age 32, male and 87% white.) A great number of these individuals report their first experience with narcotics or pain medication

followed dental treatment - particularly root canal therapy or extraction or teeth.

Prescription pain medications are a real problem. They are easy to obtain, paid for by insurance, and have less legal risk than street drugs. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration found that in 2010 to 2011; 55% of prescription pain relievers were obtained for free from family and friend, 16% were obtained bought or stolen from family and friends while 20% was obtained from a Doctor. Five percent of the prescription drugs came from unknown sources or multiple sources and about 4% was obtained from a drug dealer or stolen from a stranger. After becoming addicted, some may turn to heroin when prescription drugs become too costly or too difficult to get.

### What Needs to Be Done:

Take a complete medical history including frequency of alcohol, drugs and history of addition for the patient and members of the household.

Determine the patient's need to pain medication. Consider whether there is pain, anxiety, and or addition. Avoid writing prescriptions for pain medication at the initial patient visit. Do not refill Rx written by another. Consider over the counter medications.

Once it is decided that a prescription should be written use MAPS (Michigan Automated Prescription System) online to check the patient's prescription history. Prescribe the lowest strength and the fewest number of doses to manage the patient's pain. Advise the patient that the medication is addictive and has abuse potential. Dentist and staff should send a clear message "Prescription Medications: take correctly, store securely in a lock box, dispose properly and never share."

If it is determined that a patient needs professional pain management, is care-seeking, or drug-seeking, do not stigmatize the patient. Validate the person's pain and make the proper hand off to a medical doctor, pain specialist, or Dawn Farms 734.485.8725, Home of New Vision 734.975.1602, Health Service Access 734.544.3050. Further, one may call the primary care physician and ask that a "Pharmacy Lock" is applied to restrict opioid prescription coverage.

# CODA AND DENTAL THERAPY EDUCATION

# CODA Votes to Adopt Accrediting Standards for Dental Therapy Education Programs—ADA Reaffirms Its Opposition to Midlevel Providers:

The Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) on Friday determined that the criteria for accrediting dental therapy programs had been met and voted to implement the accreditation process for academic dental therapy programs.

The criteria that had required further comment are:

Whether the allied dental education area had been in operation for a sufficient period of time to establish benchmarks and adequately measure performance (Criteria 2); and

Whether there is evidence of need and support from the public and professional communities to sustain educational programs in the discipline (Criteria 5).

The agency's action did not recognize or accredit any specific dental therapy educational programs. It does, however, create a pathway for such programs to apply for accreditation.

In a <u>statement</u>, the ADA reaffirmed its opposition to allowing non-dentists to perform surgical procedures.

The United States Department of Education recognizes CODA as the accrediting entity for dental and dental-related education programs conducted at the post-secondary level. While CODA is an agency of the ADA, only CODA has the purview to make accreditation decisions, set standards and develop accreditation policy as outlined in the ADA Bylaws. USDE criteria require CODA to maintain a stringent conflict-of-interest policy.

The ADA considers the introduction of midlevel providers to be an oversimplified approach to solving the complex problems that keep too many people from attaining good oral health. Through <u>Action for Dental Health</u>, ADA member dentists across the country are creatively addressing access disparities in ways that build on, rather than fragment, the existing team approach to delivering care.

## **IMPORTANT NOTE:**

For those members who were unable to attend the MDA update with President Johnston, we would like to take a moment to reiterate one important note: please watch for and follow through on the action notifications regarding dental therapists. This is an issue that has the capacity to significantly alter the landscape of our profession, and we need to join the MDA in their effort to address it.
